Driving Directions: STARTING from the IGA

To Catrini Home

Left on Rt. 4
Left on Dallas Hill Rd.
0.6 mile, turn right on Harold Ross Rd.
0.8 mile, left at 174 Ross Rd Catrini Home: "Moose Watch"

From Catrini Home to Kane Home

Left on Harold Ross
0.1 mile, left Old Country Rd
0.6 mile, bear left at fork.
Bear Left at next fork
There will be someone there to direct parking.

From Kane Home to Williams Home:

From Harold Ross Road, drive 1.9 miles to Saddleback Mountain Road. Turn right.
Drive 1.9 miles to City Pond Road. Bear right and go through gate.
Drive 1.4 miles to second gate. Turn right.
Drive 0.6 miles to house

From Williams Home to Doherty Home

Return to Rt 4 via Dallas Hill Rd
Turn right onto Rt 4
Drive 0.7 miles to bottom of the hill
Turn left on Lake House Rd. (opposite Rangeley Inn)
Drive 0.2 mile, arrive at 65 Lake House Rd
The owners have requested that you remove your shoes at the door.

From Doherty Home to The Taste or Rangeley at the Gingerbread Restaurant

Exit Lake House Rd and turn left
Travel 6.77 miles
Stay straight at intersection of Rt 4 and Rt 16 onto Carry Rd
Gingerbread is 0.3 miles on the right

CATRINI HOME - 174 Harold Ross Road, Rangeley 5 bedrooms, 5 baths, 4000 + sq ft

They call it Moose Watch. We called it "wonderful." Kathy and Vince have personally and lovingly touched each piece and part of what has turned this house, built by George Crosson in 1994, into their family home. Not only does the house flow from a cozy bunk room to a fun filled game room; from a library to a spacious master bedroom; from an architectural staircase to peaceful screened porch; but to Vince's fishing gallery on the third floor, also used by their grandkids for star gazing when they look up and moose watching when they look down over the 3-acre pond, spring fed, with an island in the middle. The interior of the house is blessed with the art of many local artists, books of the Catrini's many interests, and furniture, some of it built by Vince himself in his workshop. Most of the tables in the house were built by Vince. Much of the other furniture in the house is from a furniture manufacturer from Vermont, Pompanoosuc Furniture Company. The master bedroom and spacious master bath don't show their 22 years, nor does the rest of the house and gardens, so lovingly planned and cared for. In the center of the living space, you will find the three story mortar-less fireplace custom built by Dave Morris from Kingfield, once again designed by the Catrini's. Yes "wonderful," but oh so wonderful.

KANE HOME - 174 Old County Road, Dallas Plantation, ME 6 bedrooms, 4 baths, 4,400 square feet, built in 1998

Hilltop is aptly named and noted for its spectacular western views of the lakes and mountains. The Kanes purchased it in 2010 and have lovingly brought it back to its former glory. Originally conceived by developer, Martha (Bekeney) Chase, she brought her ideas to Architectural Designer, Ellen Albrecht to realize her vision. George Crosson of Dallas Hill Construction built the home which was to be the last of a series by Martha in the Piper Brook area and decidedly her favorite. The Kanes worked with Welcome Home for the foundations of furniture while also scouring antique shops and RFA art shows for items of interest. There is an eclectic mix of fine art and whimsical pieces throughout. The main floor has an open plan making for easy entertaining. The stone fireplace sitting area, the magnificent dining table and the surrounding deck offer gathering places for family and friends no matter what the season. The second floor features the work of local water color artist Joyce Martin as well as an outhouse inspired window treatment. Fur throws, quilts and camp blankets adorn all of the beds making for cozy retreats. The Kanes commissioned king headboards from the builder as well as the live edge fireplace mantel and game room counter. The lower level is all about fun with a well appointed game room and bunk room anyone young at heart would enjoy. The gardens and fire pit area will draw you outside where you may be treated with an aerial display from a raptor or hummingbirds bickering at the feeder.

WILLIAMS HOME - 332 City Pond Road, Sandy River Plantation 4 bedrooms, 3.5 baths, 5000+ sq ft.

An unbelievable, must-see, fabulous contribution to our Home Tour. The property is powered by solar, with gas appliances, in the middle of 284 acres with views of the Saddleback Ski Area and all of the amenities for modern living! This post and beam house, built for owner Chip Williams by Charlie Ferral, with the garage and grounds done by Tom Frost, is gorgeous. Chip's grandfather was one of a group who took over Saddleback Ski area in the 60's. The beautifully designed interior is Douglas fir, the floors are ash. There is a large mortar-less fireplace and wood burning hearth, 3-1/2 natural stone baths, and a custom painted kitchen. The craftsmanship of this building, the design decisions that speak classic Maine, and the fabrics are winter-retreat perfect. Make special note of the textiles: the wool quilt and embossed fabrics are exquisite. The purple granite used throughout is magnificent. When you view the exterior, note the standing seam copper roof and flashings, aged so beautifully. Ponder the views, so spectacular, of Saddleback and beyond to Rangeley Lake and Mooselook. The very large garage behind the house is where the solar is collected and stored, and it houses the tractor and other large equipment and tools. Also on the property is an animal barn, wood shed, orchard, small cabin, pond and shooting range. This is a very special opportunity to visit this property.

DOHERTY HOME - 65 Lakehouse Road, Rangeley, Me 6 bedrooms, 5 1/2 baths, 4000+ sq ft

This beautiful creation was dreamed by Colin and Jo Doherty, designed by Knickerbocker Architects, and built by Randy Goodwin in 2012. Jo's vision for this house was for an open floor plan, but a house that surprised you at every turn. The many window seats were a must. That too was part of her vision that she captured from a house she says whose design has withstood the test of time. A walk through the house is a combination of transitional design, family friendly organization, antiques lovingly chosen - many sourced from Frost Antiques of Farmington, and colors of the heart. There are so many note-worthy ideas in this family home. The kitchen is the heart of Jo's home, she loves to cook, and the butler's pantry brings her pure joy. She loves the island supports which are made from wagon wheels. The red birch kitchen is by Birchwood Interiors; the tile from Portland Tile company. The tile in the master bath, from the same, is one of her best decisions. Many of the home furnishings came from Welcome Home where Virginia MacFawn was a valuable resource. Look up, look down and all around: there are three floors of so many things to wonder at. Oh, also a beautiful sunset view of Bald Mountain. Notable at the front door entrance is the remnant of the shuffleboard court of the old Rangeley Lake House Hotel.
